n 1996, John Pappajohn, president of Equity Dynamics, Inc., established five entrepreneurial centers throughout Iowa. The John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center (JPEC) at the University of Northern Iowa offers programs focusing on entrepreneurship education, technology transfer, and capital investment for small businesses. These programs include:

- The Certificate in Entrepreneurship

 participate in a week-long, intensive small
 business simulation
- Provide entrepreneurial students with experiential learning opportunities

 An educational lab space for student owners to explore business ideas with professional assistance

Joe Nelson Entrepreneurial Scholarship

Doe Nelson was a classic entrepreneur. He discovered and recognized the need and opportunity for an improved product, made a prototype, felt strongly enough and committed to his idea to mortgage his home to: patent his idea, buy tooling for a single cavity production mold, have the parts made, and then assembled into the Filter Minder in his basement.

Nelson recognized the need for more marketing and sales skills than he had and teamed up with H. D. (lke) Leighty who had 30 years experience in sales and marketing in the auto, truck and farm equipment industry.

Outsourcing the parts, they hired two employees and assembled the Filter Minders in a two-room commercial basement, which they quickly outgrew and moved to a larger facility.

They formed a corporation, Engineered Products Company, in 1977. At the end of that year, they had a negative net worth of \$64! However, by then they were generating enough cash flow out of increasing sales to finance the steady growth of the business.

nfortunately, Joe died in 1984. Two years later, his widow, Fran, sold her interest in the business to lke Leighty and moved to California to be near her family.

Ike continued to grow Engineered Products Company, built a new facility, formed the Leighty Charitable Foundation out of the profits and eventually sold the business to the management team and employees in 1998. They have continued to grow the business, developing new products and markets...a classic entrepreneurial evolution.

The Joe Nelson Scholarship was started by Ike Leighty to honor Joe and help recognize, encourage, and develop budding entrepreneurs. he Joe Nelson Entrepreneurial Scholarship provides two annual \$1,000 scholarships funded by Ike Leighty and the Leighty Foundation. The scholarships are for students involved in programs of the John Pappajohn Entrepreneurial Center at the University of Northern Iowa and running a business.
